St. George's Church - Bicentenary Celebration Year

This year, 2025, is the bicentenary of St. George's Church. One special activity, among various other events and activities to celebrate the bicentenary, is to create a time capsule.

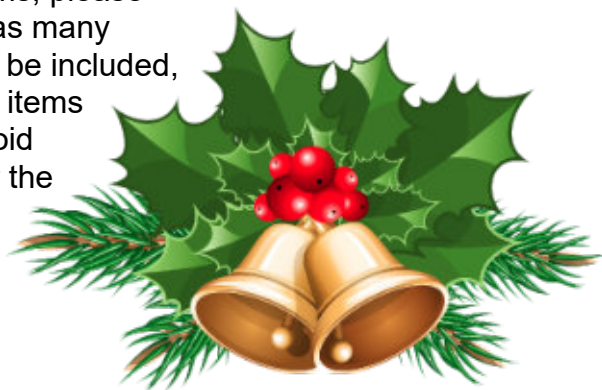
The primary purpose of a time capsule is to preserve objects and information from a specific point in time for future discovery and reflection. It serves as a snapshot of the present, intended to be opened and examined by people in the future, often with the aim of providing insights into our life experiences from the past.

One consideration has been regarding how long a time span before the capsule should be opened. The longer it is sealed, the more difficult it can be to choose items to be included. A span of 100 years is often a popular choice, however, previous experience has proved choosing a shorter time such as 50 years allows some of the original participants to experience the opening, and for the items included to bring back memories. As such, it is planned for the capsule to be opened in the year 2075.

It is planned to collect a number of appropriate items to include within the time capsule that will provide a view of what life was like in 2025, with an emphasis on our local community, parish life and St George's Church.

If you wish to include any items, please discuss with me. It is hoped as many appropriate items offered will be included, but space will be limited, and items will need to be suitable to avoid deterioration or damage over the next 50 years.

One Minute Silence will be held by members across the UK at 1.03 pm on a Saturday between the above dates as part of this campaign, the times signifying the 1 in 3.

Mothers' Union are raising awareness of and calling for an end to gender-based violence and abuse in all its forms. This is in response to the UN's 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence campaign.

We support the local Womens' Refuge within the RISE UP Campaign and at our last meeting we made up 35 gift bags



with tea, coffee, hot chocolate, sugar, sweetener and milk. We asked what they needed this time and this was what they were desperate for. Joanne (Salisbury) delivered them to Leyland, for them to be collected by Helen, (one of the Refuge Support workers). They were delighted to receive them and very grateful.

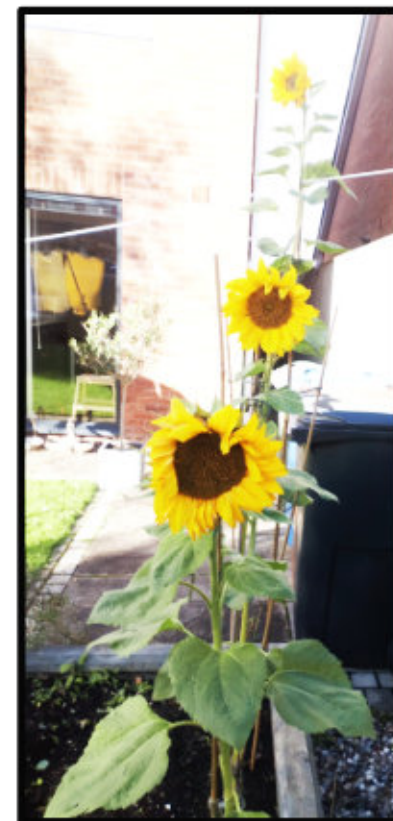
SUNFLOWER COMPETITION

Message From The Editor

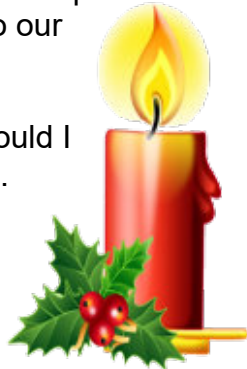

Reredos Project – Update

We are close to the Reredos project being finished. You will have noticed that the centre painting of Christ the Shepherd has now been installed. The project was previously delayed after it was decided the five paintings on the east wall would have the upper sections re-gilded with gold leaf. This was not included in the original plan, but was recommended after the initial conservation phase (cleaning) was completed. The decision to re-gild them was the right one when looking at the splendid uniformity of the gold colour across all of the paintings. I had hoped that centre painting would have been back for our Bicentenary Service, unfortunately this was not possible. This painting took slightly longer to complete due to the need for sections of the canvas to be re-tensioned on its very large flexible wooden frame before the re-gilding could be undertaken. Movement in the canvas of paintings can occur with temperature and humidity changes. Also, the planned dated to transport the painting from the Conservator's Studio in Harrogate had to be cancelled due to Storm Amy. There was a risk of damage to the painting while moving it from the studio into the van, and then from the van into church. The size of the painting results in it behaving like a very large sail when being moved. The centre painting is now secured to the reredos structure with the beading temporarily fitted. Before the beading is finally fitted and re-finished, we will monitor the tensioning of the canvas for a short period of time to identify whether any on-site re-tensioning is considered necessary by the Conservator. The Conservator will also undertake a number of final commissioning onsite activities, hopefully before the end of the year. At that time, the reproduced Commandments I-IV panel will be re-installed.

The History Page December 2025

The issue briefly described what happened to St George's subsequent to its opening in 1825. The main source for the history of its origin is the diary of architect Thomas Rickman. Understandably, the diary contains little mention of the chapel of ease once Rickman had completed his work in Chorley. However, it does allow a summary of how he himself fared until his death in 1841.

He had emerged as a leading architectural figure during the time of St George's birth. His Attempt to Discriminate the Styles of English Architecture from the Conquest to the Reformation (1817) was much read and taught the taxonomy of medieval architecture which is still used today. His move to Birmingham (1820) gave him best access to coaching routes (and later, trains) which took him to work in all the English counties by 1830. In all he "built" 37 churches and redesigned 12 more. In addition, he remodelled country houses such as Matfen Hall in Northumberland. He designed public buildings like Preston Old Court House and the "wedding cake" extension at St John's Cambridge.

Thus after 1825, he was truly in demand, not least in Lancashire where his good friend, Revd. J.W.Whittaker of Blackburn, set him to serious church extension. Again, in 1825, he began his happy third marriage -to Elizabeth Miller- and was blessed with a son, a future architect himself.

Never worried by orthodoxy, his Settle Parish Church (1838) shows him leading the way to newer asymmetrical church design, just as he had designed a holly iron church in his younger days. His final resting place is a tomb, now starkly standing alone by the demolition site of St George's Birmingham (Rickman, 1821). Some believe Chorley St George took the same name as the architect's prior church, as it took much the same plan.
