Rev. John Stock 1863, The Messenger first issue

Dear friends

I expect that many of you will have heard (and sung) the hymn “We have a gospel to proclaim!” Only those with long memories will probably be aware that the writer was The Revd Canon Eddie Burns who was vicar of St James’ here in Chorley (and rural dean) when he wrote the hymn. He went on to Christ Church Fulwood, eventually having a long retirement before going to be with Christ earlier this year.

He wrote the hymn in 1968 for a diocesan mission, some 42 years into the life of this diocese. 58 years later it’s one of the few of its era that have become classics. Rightly so, I think, for paired with a strong tune it concisely and movingly tells the story of Jesus– and why it matters.

As we celebrate 100 years of Blackburn diocese (only half the life of St George’s!) it is good to think of all those who have sung that hymn – and those who like its writer have promoted the church’s mission in their day. We have a strong heritage of faith and witness to give thanks for. And today we are called to continue to sing the song of faith in our generation. We live in an age which is far more secular than could have been imagined in 1926, or even in 1959 when All Saints’ was consecrated. Many live thinking that church is an irrelevance (at least most of the time) and even that God is but a myth. But scratch below the surface and many long for the meaning which material things cannot satisfy. Some, including younger people, are showing a new interest in the life of faith. And always the person of Jesus is compelling. It’s for good reason that the hymn focusses on Christ – and that All for Jesus is the strapline for the Centenary.

Faith calls us forward not back, but a bit of nostalgia can warm the heart – just think of all our Christmas traditions and the way carols move people. In recent years singing Assembly Bangers – hits from school assemblies over the last few decades – have become incredibly popular, even at Glastonbury! As you hopefully know we

are having our very own “Assembly Bangers” event at St George’s. On Saturday 12th September at 4pm, followed by edible bangers in a bun!

It’s the perfect occasion to bring someone with you along to church. It’ll be a lot of fun, informal, requires no commitment - and will include a short, inspiring talk by Iain Parkes, the diocesan director of education. You are of course invited – but I pray that you will invite someone along with you - “I’m going, its going to be good, do you want to come too?”

Hope to see you and your guests there. And do stop for a banger and a chat afterwards!

International Aid Shoebox Appeal 2026

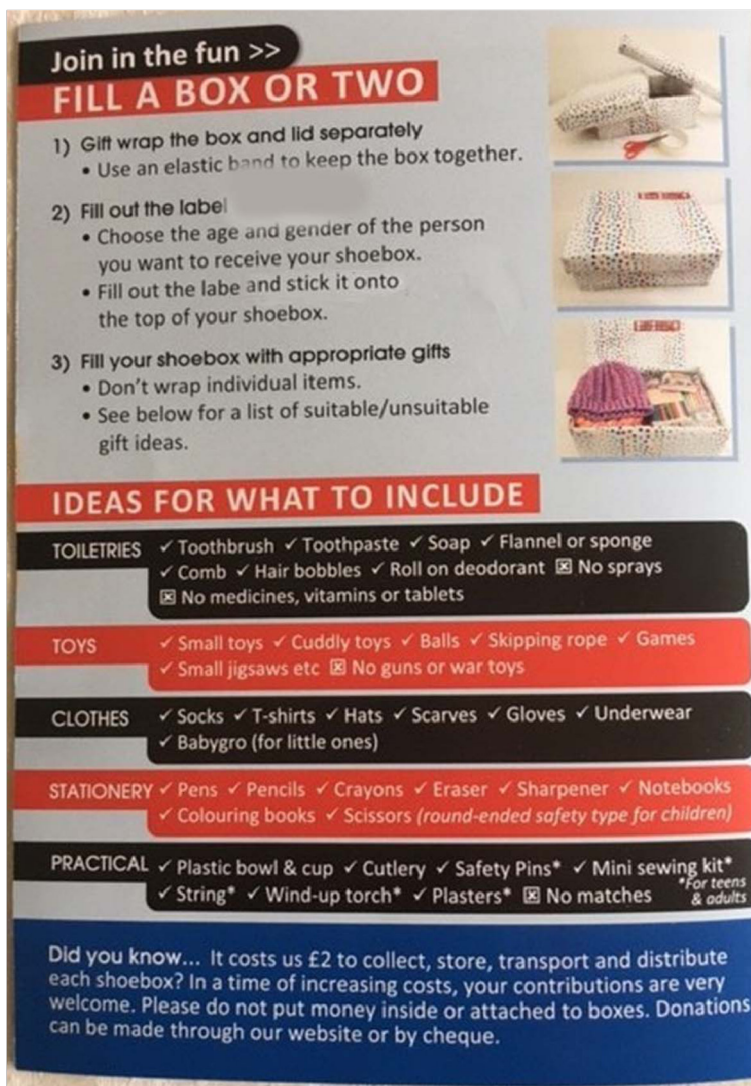
I would like to start by thanking everyone who took part in last year's shoebox appeal. 99 boxes were sent in total from both churches.

This year we are running the Appeal from 27th September to 1st November.

The shoebox appeal brings joy and hope each year to many thousands of people of all ages. These gifts have brought smiles to children and adults living in poverty in Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia, Latin America and even the UK.

When you send a shoebox you are sending more than just a box filled with useful and fun items; it's a personal gift just for the person receiving it, a message of hope and love, reflecting the love of Jesus.

It's also personal for those of us filling a shoebox; choosing who the

box is for, selecting appropriate items to send, wrapping the box, maybe writing a greetings card, all help us to care about the person who will receive the gift.

Letting people in desperate circumstances know that someone cares and they are not forgotten is so important. That's why shoeboxes are sent to people of all ages from babies to elderly people, and why they are delivered throughout the year, not just at Christmas. These gifts are distributed by International Aid's own teams and local churches who know their communities well and reach out with Christ's love to those in need.

Last Christmas, the church at Motovylyvka, in Ukraine, shared the good news of Jesus' birth through drama, songs and fun. These services were attended by hundreds of children and young people who all received a shoebox. I include a message of thanks from Pastor Andrei, "Every child received a gift from you, this is a ray of light in their lives, in these times when rockets explode above their heads, your help remains unchanged" Teams travel to several centres around Ukraine bringing hope and joy to children and families living in constant danger and despair.

Shoe boxes are also taken to Sierra Leone where they are received with gratitude and amazement at the generosity of strangers..

There are two ways you can send a shoebox, the traditional way of filling a box, wrapping and labelling it and bringing it to church or send a virtual shoebox. The virtual shoebox scheme enables you to make a donation for a box to be filled full of useful and fun items. You can choose the area of the world and age and gender of the person you would like the gift to go to. Gifts are packed and distributed by local teams, which, in turn, helps to support local economies. Should you wish to donate by this method visit www.internationalaidtrust.org.uk/shoeboxes/virtual

Details of what to put in the shoeboxes and how to wrap them are on the photo below. Leaflets are also available in church. Please do not include chocolate and if including sweets, ensure they have a long

use by date. Please donate what you are able, maybe join forces with other family members to fill a box and return to church by Sunday 1st November.

If you would like to contribute to the cost of transporting the boxes there will be a donation box by the Shoebox display at the back of church where you will also find some specially printed shoeboxes for International Aid if you haven't got one.

Spotlight on Safeguarding

Online Safety - Emails

This month I wanted to focus on staying safe on line. With online scams becoming more common, its important that you know what to look out for, and understand what to do if you suspect that you have become the victim of a scam.

As many of us use emails on a day to day basis I thought this would be a good place for us to begin.

Phishing emails are a common type of email fraud. A phishing email is where scammers send emails pretending to be from a trusted organisation to trick you into clicking through to a fake website where you're asked to enter your personal details.

The emails can look genuine and appear to be from official places, like HMRC, a bank, a well known retailer or utility provider but you can often tell it's a scam.

Some types of emails may also have a link for you to click on or a file attached for you to open. Opening these links or downloading the files may harm your device.

How will you know?

Some of the things you should look out for to keep you safe on line are

- errors in spelling or grammar, or an unusual style of writing
- unofficial or suspicious email addresses or senders
- requests for personal information, such as your username, full password or bank details – genuine organisations will never ask you for this via email
- threats that unless you act now, a deal will expire or your account will be closed. This is just something a scammer will try to frighten you into responding quickly.

What should you do if you receive an email like this?

- If you see a suspicious email, DON'T reply with your details or open any links or documents.
- Delete the email straight away.
- If the email claims to be from company you deal with, phone them directly using the phone number found on their official website and ask them if they have sent the request.
- This will also help them to alert their customers of a potential scam.

If you think you have become a victim of cyber crime, you can contact **Report Fraud**. They will help you report the incident to the police, and get the support you need.

Heritage Open Days 2026 Coming Soon

Heritage Open days will, as always, occur on the second weekend of September, this year on Friday 11th and Saturday 12th, with an additional hour after the service on Sunday.

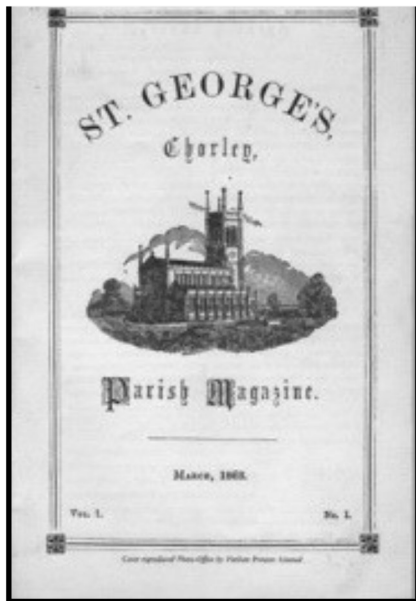
The History Page The Remarkable Thomas Brown Story continued...

Having outlined Thomas Brown's great efforts as the mid-Victorian headteacher, Sunday School superintendent, night school leader and Young Men's Association founder, it might be thought we had dealt fully with his impact by the habitual summer break in "The Messenger". Yet, there is more.

Most readers will know the first ever parish magazine was launched in 1863. One article is signed "TB". A previous commentator decided this could only refer to a cleric and Thomas Birchall was selected. However he was a curate who left in 1830 and the "TB" of 1863 is unmistakably Thomas Brown. This is evident from the articles on natural history, science, Young Men's Association excursions and church origins, all revealing Thomas Brown's interests.

Sadly he chose to launch the magazine in a depression year, at the heart of the Cotton Famine, Subscriptions were meagre and, despite Thomas' writing and editing and Miss Barton's committed marketing and delivery, the magazine folded after one year. It was to revive in 1886 and has continued ever since.

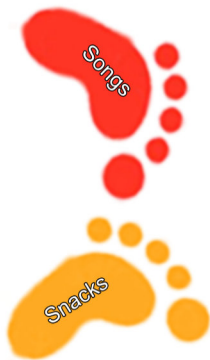

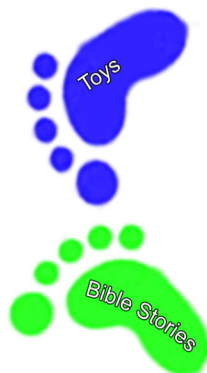

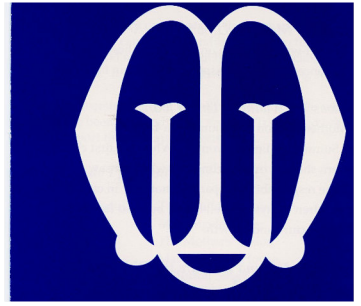

The Walk of Witness followed the day after for everyone who could attend, and I have to admit the weather was very kind.

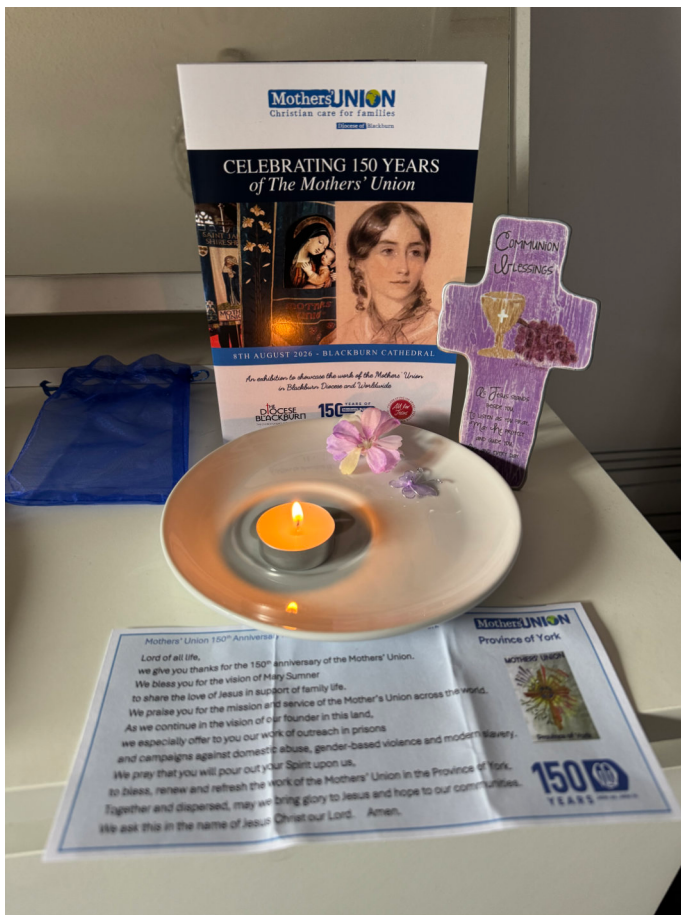
